#### COACH TRIP TO SUSSEX PRAIRIES AND BORDE HILL

We were met at the car park to Sussex Prairies by one of the founders of the garden, Pauline Mcbride, with the instruction to stay close or risk getting lost as she led us out of the fringing woodland and along one of the many narrow paths through the head-high flowering grasses and flowers. There were several expressions of awe at the colour and variety of the dramatic scale with its broad walkways between and narrow sinuous paths through plants tall enough to conceal one. We had come at its best season.

Arriving well ahead of the general public we sat in the warm sunshine with some obligatory coffee and cake to be treated to a very amusing and theatrically delivered talk by Pauline about how she and her husband had established the garden from scratch with thousands of plants propagated and how they manage the 8-acre display of large drifts of often tall grasses, rudbeckias, asters and many other flowers. Dense planting and heavy mulching control unwanted invaders, i.e., weeds, but there remains the task of clearing one year's growth ready for the next. One phrase from the talk sticks in the mind; "no fannying around with secateurs!" - they set fire to it! Mindful of the neighbours, they wait for the right conditions in late winter and whoosh, it's ready for mulching.

If anything, our time went too quickly and with a quick visit to plant sales we were off to Borde Hill.

What a contrast. On hilly ground near Haywards Heath this is an historic estate with links back to Tudor times and with long paved paths to explore. With much woodland, a huge specimen tulip tree is particularly remembered and occasional views over the Sussex Weald, this was interestingly different to our first visit.

With a history of filling a 51-seater coach for such trips it seemed a pity that so few were able to take advantage of this year's hard work by organiser Linda. It was a very worthwhile day blessed by wonderful sunshine enjoyed by all so huge thanks to Linda. Where to next year?
